

## **Greetings from the Family-Based Justice Center**





The Center recognizes the impact the criminal justice system has on the Black community, especially Black youth. Black children are <u>six times</u> as likely as White children to have a parent who's been incarcerated. Black youths who have an incarcerated parent may experience poor mental health, low educational attainment, and financial insecurity. Keeping families together would reduce harm to Black youths and their communities.

The Center would like to highlight the work of Ebony Underwood, founder and CEO of We Got Us Now, a national advocacy organization built by, led by, and about children of incarcerated parents. Ms. Underwood has done amazing work to uplift children and young adults impacted by parental incarceration, and she is a Family-Based Justice Center advisory board member. A new study from the University of Massachusetts finds that, compared with other Americans, Black adults in the United States are more likely to have family members incarcerated, have a larger average number of incarcerated family members, and experience familial incarceration over more generations.
